Introduction

This book contains 52 devotional themes, one for every week in the year. Within each week, we provide daily Scripture readings.

The rationale behind the choice of most topics is that the Bible, particularly the New Testament, gives numerous exhortations to Christians on what they should do for and with one another. Of course, these "one anothers" apply wherever two or more believers are gathered. But the place that offers the best opportunity for significant Christian relationships is the home. What happens in the family not only affects every member, but it also impacts the larger church of which the family is a part. And that will determine what sort of light we're able to shine into our dark world.

Specifically, here's what this book offers for each week:

First, the topic and a subtitle to explain it a bit more. You'll find that some topics overlap or are distinct only in subtle ways. Also, some deal with other aspects of family life; not all are derived from the "one anothers." Then:

Opening Prayer to begin the day with the Lord and to zero in on the topic for the week.

Daily Scripture Reading, often consisting of several passages, though most of them are short. On some weeks, we've also suggested additional readings. And we've chosen one passage each week to print in full for your memorization. Some of the assigned readings in this book will reoccur, since the same Bible passage can touch upon multiple topics.

Activity of the Day, which most often is a series of questions related to the Scripture readings for that day. Some blank lines have been provided so that you can jot down answers or record notes for further reflection. Do not feel that you have to answer every question; we've provided more than one so you can pick the questions that strike a chord with you.

Occasionally the activity for the day is, instead of questions, a suggested assignment for the whole family.



Conclusion to summarize the main teachings of the week.

Closing Prayer to commit your family to the Lord once again.

This devotional was written for an individual reader or a married couple. But since it's all about family, we've indicated a few places where you can involve your children if you so choose. May you all, together, hear God's voice through this yearlong tour of His Word.

3 ACTIVITY OF THE DAY

Monday

Answer this: Have you ever stopped and marveled at the existence of the family, or have you always just taken it for granted, like the air you breathe? Why?

Tuesday

What would your life be like without a family? How might society function without families?

Wednesday

Ask your spouse what's the first thing that comes to mind when recalling the family that he or she was raised in. Then share about your own family. Pray together for your parents and siblings. (If unmarried, do this with a close friend.)

Thursday

Based on the book of Genesis, how would you define a family?

Friday

At dinner, share with your spouse and/or children what you're learning or thinking about God's invention called the family.

Saturday

What did Jesus say about marriage? About divorce? Why?

Sunday

Memorize this week's featured Bible passage or your favorite portion from one of the other readings.

4 CONCLUSION

God is one, yet He is also a community of three Persons. We, too, are individuals, but we were meant to live in relationship to others. By God's design, the primary way we do that is the family, where a man and woman, together with their children, form the building block on which all of society is based. Without strong, lasting families, nothing in life can hold together.

5 CLOSING PRAYER

Talk to God alone or together about your family, friends, church, and community, as well as about what He is saying to you today through His Word. Then conclude with this:

> Father, thank You for families. Teach us to act rightly toward all members of our own family, and show us how to reach out to those who have no family at all. Amen.

We Need One Another

Families aren't just a nice idea—they're necessary.

1 OPENING PRAYER

Dear Lord, forgive us for thinking that we can go through life on our own power. Show us more and more why You placed us in families for mutual support. Amen.

3 ACTIVITY OF THE DAY

Monday

Answer this: In biblical times, people thought much more about "we" than "I." In what ways has Western culture's emphasis on "me" colored your outlook on the family? On the church?

Tuesday

In a fun family discussion over a meal, let everyone say what they are best at, what "gift" they offer that the rest of the family needs. It could be a skill, or it might be a personality trait, like "always being positive." Let others provide helpful feedback after each family member speaks.

Wednesday

"Iron sharpens iron." Who in your life provides you with that kind of support?

Thursday

How much do you really *need* your spouse? Each of your children? Are you able to develop a godly character without others knowing (and working with you on) your innermost struggles and weaknesses? Explain.

Friday

Is Scripture saying that things work out much better when we join together, or that we simply can't do much of anything without one another? Which is closer to the truth? Why?

Saturday

Pick a family activity or chore that you can accomplish only if you all pitch in and do it together. Then grab a dessert and talk about the day's work.

Sunday

Memorize this week's featured Bible passage or your favorite portion from one of the other readings.

4 CONCLUSION

Your family is more than a collection of individuals living under one roof. It's a body that thrives only when all parts are working together as a whole. But in a culture driven by an emphasis on the individual, this biblical truth is almost unimaginable. We *need* one another. Our lives are defined and made meaningful only in relationship to others.

5 CLOSING PRAYER

Talk to God alone or together about your family, friends, church, and community, as well as about what He is saying to you today through His Word. Then conclude with this:

> Lord, forgive us when we think or say, "I have no real need for that family (or church) member." As we work through this devotional guide, show us what sort of relationships You desire us to have, so that together we can grow up into You and become more fruitful in our faith. Amen.
